These two herees, side by side, Sleep the dreamless sleep death, covered by the green sward of our cemetery. This community will not have done its duty, until we mark their last resting place with a suitable monitment. And I appeal to every lover of our soldier boys, who on the 2nd day of Mar, 1898, marched away so bravely defend our country's honor, to respond to this appeal to suitably mark the honored graves of these two heroes. who will come back no more forever. 1 will hand Mr. Leo. D. Heartt, cashier of the First National Bank, my check for \$100 for the purpose herein stated, and this is to invite any who feel dis-posed to join me in this matter to pay Mr. Leo D. Heartt, cashler, whatever amounts they feel disposed to con-tribute,"
